

It is the beginning of the twentieth century, Jews and Orthodox Christians live in the little village of Anatevka in pre-revolutionary Russia of the Tsars. Reb Tevye, the milkman is a poor man, married for twenty five years to Golde and they have five daughters. Among the many traditions of the Jewish community, the matchmaker arranges the wedding match and the father approves it.

When the local matchmaker Yente arranges a match between Tevye's eldest daughter Tzeitel and wealthy widower Lazar Wolf the village butcher, Tevye agrees. However Tzeitel is in love with a poor tailor- Motel Kamzoil and when the pair plead for Tevye's permission to marry he eventually agrees to please his daughter. When his second daughter Hodel and the revolutionary student Perchik fall in love Tevye is forced once again to accept their marriage. When Perchik is arrested by Tsarist troops and is sent away, Hodel decides to leave her family and homeland and travel to Siberia to be with her beloved.

Tevye's third daughter Chava falls for the Orthodox Christian Fyedka. Tevye is torn between his traditional religious beliefs and his deep love for his family. He is unable to come to terms with their union. Meanwhile the Tsars troops evict the Jewish community from Anatevka.

Fiddler on the Roof is a story of life within a small Russian town in 1905, during a time where the country was still an empire. It was ruled by the head of the Dictorial Romanov Dynasty Tsar Nicholas II, who believed in the traditional ideas of absolute monarchy. Whilst the rest of Europe was moving forward in Democracy, Russia was still firmly grounded in dictatorship.

Along with other breaches of human rights, Nicholas II was instrumental in publishing a great deal of anti-Semitic propaganda. This programme cited fear and hatred amongst the Jewish population, as it deliberately discriminated against them simply because of their religion.

Anti-Semitism was present in many forms, including violence, political oppression and isolation. Hostility towards the Jews dates back to Ancient Times, perhaps to the beginning of their history. From the early days of the Bible to the height of the Roman Empire, Jews were punished and criticised for trying to remain a separate religious and social group to the Christian majority.

The discrimination towards the Jews grew because of the rise of Christianity. In this period, not only were Jews considered outsiders, but they were also seen as people who rejected and ignored Christ. Despite the fact that Roman authorities ordered the crucifixion of Jesus, Jews were completely blamed for his death. They were persecuted across the empire, forced to live in all-Jewish ghettos, and accused of poisoning rivers and wells during times of disease. As such, many were forced to practice Christianity to avoid torture, execution and death.

The first Jewish communities arrived to England with William the Conqueror in 1066, and gave the religious group significant economic advantages. Essentially, they acquired a reputation of being money-lenders, which made them extremely unpopular with the Church and the general public. An image of the Jew as a diabolical figure who hated Christ started to become widespread, and anti-Semitic myths such as the Tale of the Wandering Jew began to pop up. Edward I, realising he was in huge levels of debt, he summoned his knights to impose a steep tax. To make the tax more palatable, King Edward I in exchange essentially offered to expel all Jews. The heavy tax was passed, and three days later, on July 18, the Edict of Expulsion was issued. One official reason for the expulsion was that Jews had neglected to follow the Statute of Jewry. The edict of expulsion was widely popular and met with little resistance, and the expulsion was quickly carried out.

The Holocaust was the mass murder of six million Jews during World War II, a programme of systematic state murder by Nazi Germany. Before the Holocaust began, approximately nine million Jews lived in Europe. However, two thirds were killed, including one million children and two million women. The persecution of the Jews was undertaken in various stages, with the Nazis firstly prohibiting German citizenship for Jewish people in 1935. Concentration camps were established; where prisoners were forced to work slave labour until they died of exhaustion. In fact, many of these inmates were sent to extermination camps, where, if they survived the journey, were killed systematically in gas chambers.

As mentioned above, Tsar Nicholas II was extremely influential in the anti-Semitic programme during his reign of Russia. During the period 1903-1906, various laws were implemented which severely affected the lives of Jews in small communities. Many of these programmes occurred in the places that Jews could legally settle. As such, Shtetls such as Anatevka, the fictitious village in Fiddler on the Roof, began to disappear as discriminatory laws against Jewish citizens forbade them from living in rural areas, or in towns of less than 10,000 people. Indeed, as Fiddler begins, the people of Anatevka have just received word of the Tsar's edict, which will shortly evict them from their homes. By the musical's end, the people of Anatevka are packed up, some moving to America, many others to Krakow (in modernday Poland), for what they hope will be a new and better life.
